# **Cavaliers Too Fast and Talented for Bethel-Tate**

The opening round of the playoffs more often than not feature matchups of teams who look equal on paper but in reality are not that evenly matched. That was the case this week as Bethel-Tate with a 6-3 record came to Cavaliers stadium to face Coldwater.

But observers found out very quickly that you cannot capture on paper or even on film just how fast and talented the Cavaliers are compared to the Tigers. In fairness though, Bethel only dressed 23 of their 25 players. And one player had to change uniforms at half time as he moved from a defensive lineman to offensive back because of an injury to one of his teammates.

The Tigers played with a lot of heart but the Cavaliers were just too much for them to handle. Mercifully the deed was swift and painless. Coldwater scored on their first five possession and six times in the first half. Then the second string took them home as the Cavaliers prevailed 42-0.

The Tigers took the opening kick off and got a first down, but were forced to punt. The punt only covered 13 yards and Coldwater took over at mid-field.

Coldwater must have seen a vulnerability on film because the first play saw Jack Hemmelgarn throw a 10 yard pass to his leading receiver Aaron Harlamert and he flipped the ball to the Chris Post. Petey took it untouched for a 40 yard touchdown run. A hook and lateral on the first play of the game! (Not a hook and ladder folks - we're talkin' football here, not fighting fires).

Following a three and out by Bethel, Harley scored on a 43 yard run. Two minutes later Kraig Schoenherr exploded for a 51 yard touchdown run and with just 2 minutes left in the first quarter Kyle McKibben, who returned a punt 47 yards to the Tiger's 2 yard line, completed the final 2 yards on a jet sweep.

At the 10:11 mark of the second quarter Hemmy hooked up with Petey on a 56 yard pass and Coldwater led 35-0. Just before half time Petey got the final score of the night on a 5 yard run.

Those six scoring drives covered 299 yards. It only took 15 plays (a 20 yards per play average) and used up just 3:52 of the first half clock. Swift and painless.

The running clock does have it's detractors, but the Tigers were looking at a 2 ½ hour bus ride home, so the second half did not take very long. Coldwater took the ball first and the JVs ran off a few plays driving the ball deep in to Tiger territory but turned it over on downs.

# Bethel-Tate took over and ran their Wing-T offense very well. They used up the rest of the 3rd quarter clock and the first four minutes of the 4th quarter moving the ball inside the Cavalier 10 yard line. With the fans and the varsity defense cheering them on the JVs stiffened and forced a bad pitch on fourth down to end the drive. The Cavs offense took over and used the rest of the game clock to bring a quick end to a good fight by the Tigers.

Hemmelgarn was 6 of 11 passing for 131 yards. Nine Cav rushers picked up 287 yards on just 23 carries. Post had 105 rushing yards on 7 carries and caught 2 passes for 103 more to total 208 yards on the night. As a team the Cavs racked up 428 yards on just 35 plays. The Cavalier defense picked up their 5th shut out of the season limiting the Tigers to just 142 yards on 55 rushing plays and 0 yards on five passes

The win moves Coldwater to 11-0 and they will travel to Piqua on Friday to face 10-1 Cincinnati Hills Christian Academy who battled 5-6 North Union to a 35-24 victory.

The two teams met last season in the state semifinal at Piqua where Coldwater prevailed by a final score of 34-3
